Women still face pay gap at universities

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University faculties have become more inclusive of women in recent decades, though salaries for female staff still trail that of their male counterparts, new fig-

ures show.
A Statistics Ganada report has revealed that the average salary of full-time faculty staff at Canadian universities was \$115,513 in the 2010-11 school year, up 2.8 per cent from the previous year.

Average pay for male teaching staff was \$120,378 but \$106,970 for female employees — 88.9 per cent of men's pay.

"The difference between men and women is largely influenced by the larger number of males at the higher academic

e ranks," Statistics Canada reported.
The data showed women made up 36.6

per cent of full-time university teaching staff in 2010-11, but just 23.4 per cent of full professors. Women accounted for 38.2 per cent of associate professors and 46.4 per cent of assistant professors.

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Among full professors, the average salary was \$137,846 for women, 95 per cent of the \$145,045 average for men.

The report also showed that in 1970-71, female teaching staff at universities made just 78.3 per cent of the average male salary, and women accounted for a little more than 10 per cent of full-time teaching staff.

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
