- before eating & drinking
- before, during, & after handling or preparing food
- after using the toilet or helping someone else use the toilet
- after changing a child's diaper or a depends on an adult
- after blowing your nose or helping someone with a runny nose
- after coughing or sneezing
- · before inserting contact lens
- before visiting or caring for sick people
- wash hands more often when someone in your home is sick
- after handling blood or body fluids (like vomit, lung secretions, used tissues)

- after handling garbage, touching cleaning cloths or soil
- after you get home from work, or outside activities

- whenever hands look dirty

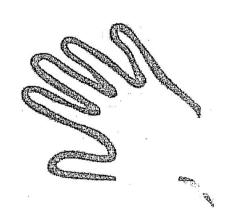

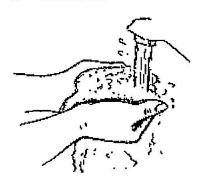

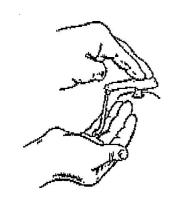
STEPS TO GOOD HAND WASHING.

4. Rub soap over the back and the front of both hands



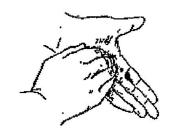
5. Clean your knuckles



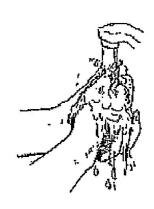
6. Clean the space between the thumb and index finger
